## 13. NORTH SAN DIEGO COUNTY REGIONAL RECYCLED WATER PROJECT – APPROVAL FOR FUNDING PROGRAMMATIC ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT REPORT AND PROJECT FEASIBILITY STUDY

The General Manager reported that the twelve governmental organizations that make up the North San Diego County Regional Recycled Water Project retained the consulting firm RMC Engineering to prepare a Regional Recycled Water Facilities Plan. This engineering report is expected to be completed in May 2012. The General Manager stated that the next step in the planning process is to prepare a project feasibility study and a programmatic environmental impact report (PEIR). With the completion of the feasibility study and the PEIR, greater clarity will be gained for expanding and interconnecting recycled water systems within North San Diego County.

Projects being considered include expanding existing irrigation recycled water projects, industrial use of recycled water, development of regional storage, and purification for

replenishing drinking water supplies. The anticipated cost of the Feasibility Study and PEIR is approximately \$482,000. It is expected that the SEJPA's portion of this cost will not exceed \$60,250 and these funds are available in the Water Reclamation Program Budget. Upon completion of the study and PEIR, project costs can be submitted for full grant reimbursement.

Moved by Board Member Muir and seconded by Vice Chair Roberts to:

- 1. Approve funding for the Programmatic Environmental Impact Report and Project Feasibility Study, not-to-exceed \$60,250; and
- 2. Authorize the General Manager to execute a Regional Agreement for joint cost sharing of the Programmatic Environmental Impact Report and Project Feasibility Study, not-to-exceed \$60,250.

Motion carried with unanimous vote of approval.

### 14. GENERAL MANAGER'S REPORT

The General Manager provided an update on construction activities of the San Elijo Water Reclamation Facility. He stated that there is currently three contractors on site; Southern Contracting Company for the Electrical Upgrades Project, ARB for the City of Encinitas's Olivenhain Force Main Replacement Project, and W.M. Lyles for the Advanced Water Treatment Project. Board Member Campbell requested the SEJPA staff research if the abandoned force main could be of value to the SEJPA in the future. Michael Thornton reported that he will be attending the WateReuse Annual Conference in Sacramento on Sunday, March 25 through Tuesday, March 27.

### 16. GENERAL COUNSEL'S REPORT

General Counsel Aiko Yamakawa stated that the FPCC has scheduled a hearing on March 15 in regard to amending the Political Reform Act regulation in reference to appointments to a committee, board or commission of a public agency that would essentially create an exception to the \$250 personal financial effects threshold, by clarifying that such appointments are not deemed to have a material financial effect on the public official's economic interests in his/her personal finances.

Board Member Campbell asked for a future update on the LAFCO issue that was mentioned in the February 2012 meeting.

### 17. BOARD MEMBER COMMENTS

Chair Barth mentioned her observation of a large amount of construction occurring in the Camp Pendleton base that could have a potential need for recycled water.

Vice Chair Roberts stated that NCTD is considering opening a stop at Camp Pendleton and also at the Convention Center. Also, the California Coastal Commission has approved environmental water initiatives at the Del Mar Fairgrounds.

### 18. CLOSED SESSION

The Board of Directors adjourned to closed session at 9:40 a.m., with Labor Negotiators Michael Thornton and Greg Lewis, per Government Code Section 54957.6: Labor Negotiations.

The Board of Directors came out of closed session at 10:14 a.m. with no reportable action and adjourned at 10:15 a.m. The next Board of Directors meeting will be held on April 9, 2012.

### DISCUSSION

### Monthly Treatment Plant Performance and Evaluation


Figure 1 (attached) provides monthly supply demands for recycled water over the last five years. Figure 2 (attached) provides a graphical view of annual recycled water demand spanning the last eleven fiscal years. Recycled water demand can fluctuate from year to year, which is typically a function of weather. For example, Fiscal Year 2003-04, an unusually dry year, resulted in increased recycled water demand; and Fiscal Year 2004-05, an unusually wet year, resulted in lower recycled water demand.

Wastewater treatment for the San Elijo Joint Powers Authority (SEJPA) met all NPDES ocean effluent limitation requirements for the month of February 2012. The primary indicators of treatment performance include the removal of Carbonaceous Biochemical Oxygen Demand (CBOD) and Total Suspended Solids (TSS). The SEJPA is required to remove a minimum of 85 percent of the CBOD and TSS from the wastewater. Treatment levels for CBOD and TSS were 98.1 percent and 96.7 percent, respectively, for February (as shown in Figure 1 and Figure 2).





### Member Agency Flows

Presented below are the influent and effluent flows for the month of February. Average daily influent flows were recorded for each Member Agency. Total effluent flow was recorded for the San Elijo Water Reclamation Facility.

Table 1 (below) presents the historical average, maximum, and unit influent and effluent flow rates per month for each of the Member Agencies since July 2008. It also presents the number of connected Equivalent Dwelling Units (EDUs) for each of the Member Agencies during this same time period.

Figure 3 (below) presents the historical average daily flows per month for each Member Agency. This is to provide a historical overview of the average treated flow by each agency. As shown in the figure, the average treated flow typically ranges between 2.9 and 3.1 million gallons per day (mgd). Also shown in Figure 3 is the total wastewater treatment capacity of the plant, 5.25 mgd, of which each Member Agency has the right to 2.5 mgd, and Rancho Santa Fe Community Service District has the right to 0.25 mgd.

Recycled Water Production


For the month of February 2012, recycled water demand was 43.26 acre-feet (AF), which was met using 43.26 AF of recycled water and 0.00 AF of supplementation with potable water. This equates to a blend mix for February of 100.0 percent recycled water and 0.0 percent potable water supplementation.

FISCAL YEAR 2012-13 RECOMMENDED BUDGET

### **RECOMMENDATION**

It is recommended that the Board of Directors:

- 1. Review the Fiscal Year 2012-13 Recommended Budget; and
- Discuss and take action as appropriate.

### DISCUSSION

The Fiscal Year (FY) 2012-13 San Elijo Joint Powers Authority (SEJPA) Recommended Budget has been prepared in accordance with the SEJPA formation agreement and the SEJPA's existing service agreements with other government entities. The budget estimates all expenditures necessary to provide wastewater treatment, waste disposal, water reclamation, laboratory, ocean outfall, and pump station services.

The total recommended Fiscal Year (FY) 2012-13 budget for the Wastewater Treatment Fund (which includes operations and maintenance for wastewater, laboratory, outfall, and pump stations, as well as bond debt for the 2011 Revenue bonds for the SEJPA is \$5,374,877, a 4.7 percent decrease from a year ago. Revenues to support the Wastewater Treatment Fund come from the users of the provided services. The total recommended FY 2012-13 operating budget for the Water Reclamation Fund (which includes operations and maintenance, as well as debt service expenses) is \$1,957,028, a 7.2 percent increase from a year ago. The entire increase is attributable to the additional debt service payment for the Advanced Water Treatment Project. Water Reclamation Fund revenues come from the sale of recycled water. Future recycled water sales are forecasted to be adequate to fund this new debt. The FY 2012-13 appropriation for the Capital Project Fund is \$1,032,000, up from \$942,000 and is funded based on ownership or leased capacity of the facilities being improved or constructed.

The proposed operations budget, which includes services for the Member Agencies, the cities of Del Mar and Escondido, the San Dieguito Water District and Santa Fe Irrigation

District, and the Rancho Santa Fe Community Service Districts, will decrease nearly \$40,000, or 0.8 percent. These are the day to day costs of operating and maintaining the facilities managed by the SEJPA and exclude debt service and capital projects.

SEJPA management has reviewed in detail all aspects of operations to control costs without impacting the agency's ability to perform the vital functions it is tasked to do. The two largest programs, Wastewater Treatment, and Recycled Water, decreased 1.7 percent and 1.8 percent respectively. The Laboratory Program and Outfall Program were the only programs with an increase in their respective budgets. All other programs had decreases in their budgets. When capital project funding and debt service are added to this, the services provided to the cities of Encinitas and Solana Beach are proposed to decrease 6.9 percent and 3.4 percent, respectively.

The cost for wastewater treatment and disposal services borne by the ratepayers of the Member Agencies are allocated based on use, indicated by measured flows or level of effort, as appropriate. Flows are averaged over a 12 month period and vary from year to year, impacting the level of participation for each agency. On the basis of 15,992 connected equivalent dwelling units (EDU's) through December 2011, the services provided to the Member Agencies by the SEJPA for wastewater treatment and disposal will cost an average of \$153.14 per EDU. This represents an decrease of 4.7 percent from a year ago. In historic terms, the proposed EDU rate reflects an annualized increase of *less than 1.2 percent* since the facility was upgraded to secondary treatment twenty years ago (average EDU rate was \$127 in Fiscal Year 1993-94).

Contingency funding for each program area has been reviewed and budgeted on the basis of potential for unforeseen events within each program area. For all programs, the amount of contingency funding is \$118,630, a \$41,960 decrease from a year ago. This is a predetermined percentage of each program's supplies and services budget. Beginning this year, the Recycled Water Program will no longer budget contingency funds.

The Water Reclamation Program has completed its eleventh full year of recycled water sales. Water sales revenues are expected to increase approximately 5.0 percent from the current fiscal year. It is anticipated that sales volume will be about 1,150 acre-feet (AF) in the upcoming fiscal year. The program is projected to generate \$2.07 million in recycled water revenues for FY 2012-13. Expenses are projected to be \$1.96 million, which includes the \$834,675 loan payment to the State Revolving Fund and the \$148,153 annual payment for the Advanced Water Treatment loan.

The SEJPA Capital Improvement Program includes both new and ongoing projects for improvements to the wastewater treatment, ocean outfall, pumping stations, and the water reclamation programs. For the wastewater treatment program, capital projects include (1) the completion of the electrical system upgrades, which include replacing outdated electrical equipment and emergency power systems; (2) Headworks and Grit Chamber Rehabilitation Project, (3) Biosolids Upgrade Reserve, (4) energy efficiency improvements, (5) hydraulic management of the outfall, and (6) digester rehabilitation and upgrades. For the Olivenhain Pump Station, funding is being requested from the Cardiff Sanitary Division to implement an ozone treatment process for odor control at that station. Funding is being requested for the Ocean Outfall Program to create a reserve for an ocean outfall reballast project which is generally done about every seven years. All of these projects were listed in the Water Reclamation Facility Master Plan prepared by Corollo Engineers in 2007.

Debt service for the SEJPA is budgeted at \$2,493,645, which is a 3.8 percent decrease from last year. Even though additional debt was incurred to complete the construction of the Advanced Water Treatment Project significant savings will be realized due to refinancing the 2003 Revenue bonds and the California Energy Commission loan. The annual debt consists of the 2011 Revenue Bond payment of \$1,480,817 for the construction of the Secondary Treatment Upgrades Project in 1991, a State Revolving Fund loan payment of \$834,675 for the construction of the Recycled Water System in 2000, and the Advanced Water Treatment loan payment of \$148,153 for the construction of treatment improvements to recycled water system.

All issues related to the FY 2012-13 recommended budget are discussed in detail in the budget document, along with information regarding the contribution requirements of the various agencies served by the SEJPA.

### SUMMARY

The total recommended FY 2012-13 budget for the Wastewater Treatment Fund for the SEJPA is \$5,374,877, which is a 4.7 percent decrease from a year ago. Revenues to support the Wastewater Treatment Fund come from the users of the provided services. The total recommended FY 2012-13 budget for the Water Reclamation Fund is \$1,957,028, which is a 7.2 percent increase from a year ago (all of which is attributable to new debt service). Water Reclamation Fund revenues come from the sale of recycled water. The FY 2012-13 appropriation for the Capital Project Fund is \$1,032,000, which will fund Capital Infrastructure associated with upgrading the San Elijo Water Reclamation Facility sludge digester system, Headworks and Grit Chamber Rehabilitation Project, additional funding to the ocean outfall system, energy efficiency, and continued funding for the biosolids facility upgrade reserve.

The budget document has been prepared to provide detailed information regarding each program and the cost of services to the Member Agencies and other contracted service recipients.

It is therefore recommended that the Board of Directors:

- 1. Review the Fiscal Year 2012-13 Recommended Budget; and
- 2. Discuss and take action as appropriate.

### RECOMMENDATION

- 1. Authorize the General Manager to submit form 8038-T to the Internal Revenue Service along with the \$158,838.86 payment due; and
- 2. Discuss and take action as appropriate.

### **BACKGROUND**

In December 2011, the SEJPA refinanced two existing debts into one single debt for the benefit of lowering interest payment costs and for shortening the term of the bonds. The two debts refinanced were the 2003 Refunding Revenue Bonds and the California Energy Commission (CEC) loan both of which financed capital projects for wastewater treatment improvements. The debt refinanced included \$11,360,000 of bonds with a remaining life of approximately 8 years at an average annual interest rate of 4.88 percent and an outstanding CEC loan of \$1,009,328 with a remaining life of 11 years at an interest rate of 3.95%.

The new refinanced debt, now called the 2011 Refunding Revenue Bonds, sold on December 7, 2011. The bonds had a total principal amount of \$9,235,000, with an average annual interest rate of 2.46 percent. The majority of this debt will be paid off in 7 years, with the remainder in 9 years.

### DISCUSSION

The next and final step in refunding the 2003 Bonds is to complete the federal arbitrage report to ensure the tax exempt status of the bonds was not compromised by excess earnings on the reserve account during the life of the bonds. The bonds cannot earn more than the 3.847 percent arbitrage yield calculated for the bonds. As part of the refunding, the SEJPA negotiated a settlement with the reserve account investor, Wells Fargo Bank to end the forward purchase agreement the bond reserves were invested in when the reserve was established in 2003. Due to the interest rate being paid on these investments, which was above the current market rate, Wells Fargo was willing to pay a premium to terminate the

contract. This premium is considered interest earnings for the purpose of arbitrage and is added to the earnings of the reserve over its life. This caused the reserve to earn in excess of the arbitrage yield for the period 2003 through 2011. The final arbitrage report requires earnings in excess of the arbitrage yield be relinquished to the Internal Revenue Service to maintain the tax exempt status of the bonds. The final arbitrage report was completed by Willdan Financial Service in March 2012 and the report concluded that the SEJPA reserve fund earnings exceeded the arbitrage yield calculation by \$158,838.86.

### FINANCIAL IMPACT

The cost of \$158,838.86 due the Internal Revenue Service to rebate excess earnings on the reserve fund of the bonds has no impact on the SEJPA or Member Agencies' budget's since the rebate is taken from the proceeds paid to the SEJPA by Wells Fargo Bank. The payment will be made by the SEJPA, and a request will be made to the City of Solana Beach and the City of Encinitas for \$84,184.60 and \$74,654.26 respectively, as their pro-rata share of the amount due.

PARTNERSHIP WITH OLIVENHAIN MUNICIPAL WATER DISTRICT (OMWD)

REGARDING LOCAL WATER SUPPLY DEVELOPMENT

### RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Board of Directors:

- Authorize the General Manager to enter into Agreement with the Olivenhain Municipal Water District for the conveyance, treatment, and recycling or disposal of test water associated with the Proposed San Elijo Groundwater Project (SEVGP); and
- 2. Discuss and take action as appropriate.

### **BACKGROUND**

San Elijo Joint Powers Authority (SEJPA) and the Olivenhain Municipal Water District (OMWD) are individually developing water supply, treatment, and enhancement projects for the benefit of their respective ratepayers. The SEJPA has experienced strong success in owning and operating a recycled water utility that serves residents and businesses in the cities of Encinitas, Solana Beach, and Del Mar. Similarly, OMWD has achieved success in developing its own recycled water utility which has allowed the agency to diversify its water supply portfolio.

Over the last several years, the SEJPA and OMWD have partnered on Integrated Regional Water Management (IRWM) projects to improve and expand local water supplies. Success has been achieved in this area including a \$1.5 million grant for the North San Diego County Regional Recycled Water Projects and a \$1.05 million grant for the North San Diego County Cooperative Demineralization Project.

### DISCUSSION

As part of the North San Diego County Cooperative Demineralization Project, OMWD is currently studying the feasibility of a brackish water purification project known as the San Elijo Valley Groundwater Project (SEVGP). To determine the water quality and quantity in a deep aquifer beneath the San Elijo Lagoon, a test well needs to be constructed and a three-day pump

test performed. To maximize the scientific benefits, OMWD has partnered with the United States Geological Survey to construct the test well and to study the geophysical traits, water quality, and water availability in the aquifer. The test well is planned for a depth of up to 1,200 feet, well below the influence of the lagoon to prevent any potential negative environmental effects. OMWD is working with the city of Solana Beach, the city of Encinitas, and the California Department of Transportation to acquire encroachment permits for the project, and it is also coordinating with the San Elijo Lagoon Conservancy and County of San Diego Department of Parks and Recreation.

OMWD has contacted the SEJPA to inquire if treatment and disposal of the water extracted from the three-day test could be provided. The flow rate is estimated to be 200 gallons per minute for up to 72 hours.

SEJPA staff has evaluated this request and has determined that the San Elijo Water Reclamation Facility could treat and either recycle or dispose of this water and therefore supports the acceptance of the test water. In addition, the SEJPA will review the agreement with the engineering staff from the Member Agencies to ensure consensus on the project approach and to determine if additional control parameters need to be incorporated to protect all parties.

### FINANCIAL IMPACTS

OMWD will provide full cost recovery to the SEJPA for conveyance, treatment, and disposal associated with the proposed three-day pump test. Furthermore, it will be required that OMWD agrees to defend, indemnify and hold harmless the SEJPA and its Member Agencies against any costs, damages, or liabilities arising out of such operations. Therefore, it is expected that this is a cost neutral project to the SEJPA.

It is therefore recommended that the Board of Directors:

- 1. Authorize the General Manager to enter into Agreement with the Olivenhain Municipal Water District for the conveyance, treatment, and recycling or disposal of test water associated with the Proposed San Elijo Valley Groundwater Project (SEVGWP); and
- 2. Discuss and take action as appropriate.
