#### 12. BUILDING IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM

General Manager Thornton presented the Building Improvement Program – Preliminary Design Report and introduced Joe Mansfield of Roesling Nakamura Terada to the Board of Directors. The report provides the basis for the final design of the building project. It documents site constraints, existing utility locations, building code and permitting requirements, and proposed regional transportation projects, all of which helps shape the final design. Furthermore, it analyzes the existing and potential future work flow and space requirements, which influence the size and configuration of the proposed buildings. Mr. Thornton stated that upon Board acceptance of the preliminary design report, the document will be provided to the architectural firms proposing on the final design and permitting phase of the project. It is anticipated that final design proposals will be received mid-January 2017, with interviews of the top rated firms occurring by the

end of the month, and contract award recommendations to the SEJPA Board in February 2017.

The General Manager stated that the preliminary design report provides an estimated building project cost of \$7.4 million. By the end of the fiscal year, the SEJPA will have collected \$785,000 in capital funding for the project. The remaining project costs are proposed to be financed either through a State Revolving Fund (SRF) loan or tax-free municipal bonds. The planned capital expenditure is incorporated into the member agencies' sewer rates and will not cause an unplanned increase. SEJPA will also seek to partner with Caltrans and other agencies to fund and build some of the proposed site improvements including the regional bike path.

#### 15. <u>GENERAL COUNSEL'S REPORT</u>

Adriana Ochoa updated the Board Members on AB-626, AB-1661, and the Kern County decision regarding Measure E. AB-626, which becomes effective in January, establishes a claim resolution process applicable to any claim by a contractor in connection with a public works project. It specifies the details and procedures to be followed in the processing of such claims. It also requires the text of these provisions, or a summary, be set forth in the plans or specifications of any public work which may give rise to a claim. Under AB-1661, elected officials who receive any type of compensation from a local agency are required to receive 2 hours of training and education on sexual harassment

prevention within the first 6 months of taking office or commencing employment, and thereafter every 2 years. Finally, Tulare County Superior Court Judge Lloyd Hicks issued a 48 page tentative opinion striking down a 2006 voter initiative (Measure E) that banned the land application of biosolids to farmland in Kern County.

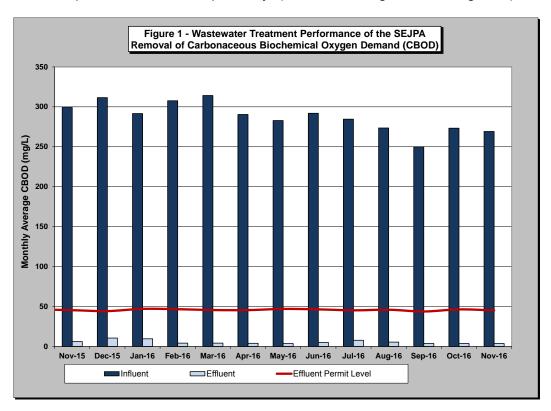

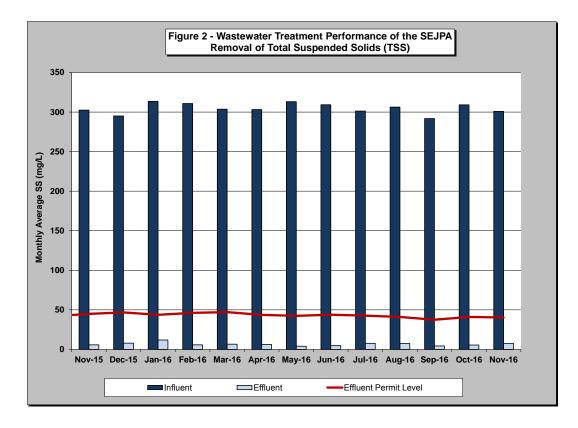

#### DISCUSSION

#### Monthly Treatment Plant Performance and Evaluation

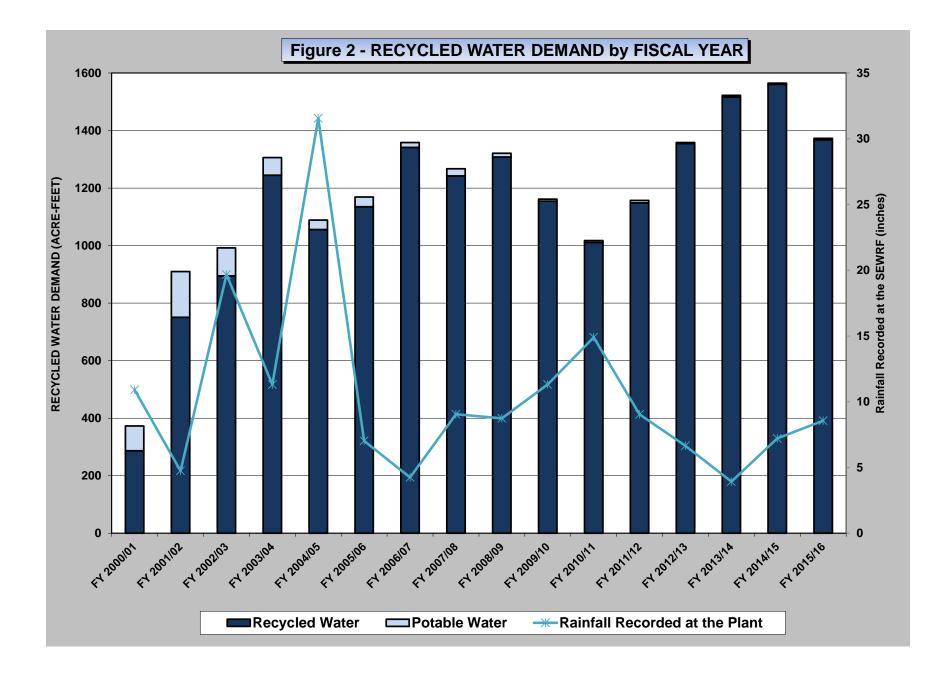
Figure 1 (attached) provides monthly supply demands for recycled water since September 2000. Figure 2 (attached) provides a graphical view of annual recycled water demand spanning sixteen fiscal years. Figure 3 (attached) shows the monthly recycled water demand for each October since the program began operating.

Wastewater treatment for the San Elijo Joint Powers Authority (SEJPA) met all NPDES ocean effluent limitation requirements for the month of November 2016. The primary indicators of treatment performance include the removal of Carbonaceous Biochemical Oxygen Demand (CBOD) and Total Suspended Solids (TSS). The SEJPA is required to remove a minimum of 85 percent of the CBOD and TSS from the wastewater. For the month of November, treatment levels for CBOD and TSS were 98.6 and 97.4 percent removal, respectively, (as shown in Figure 1 and Figure 2).





#### Member Agency Flows

Presented below are the influent and effluent flows for the month of November. Average daily influent flows were recorded for each Member Agency. Total effluent flow was calculated for the San Elijo Water Reclamation Facility.

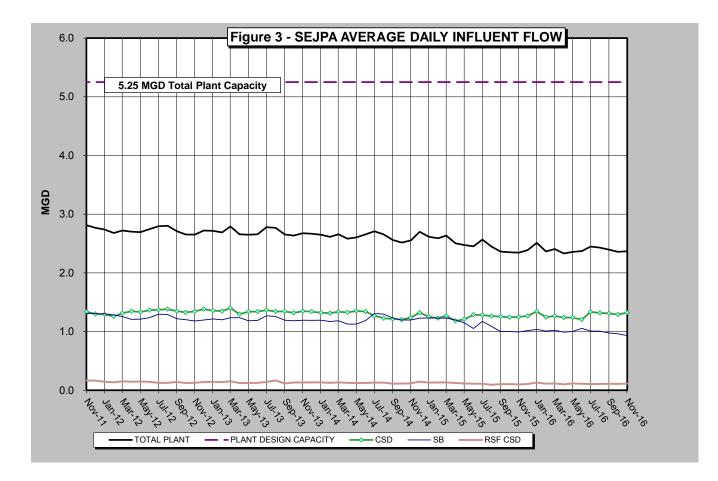

#### **Recycled Water Production**

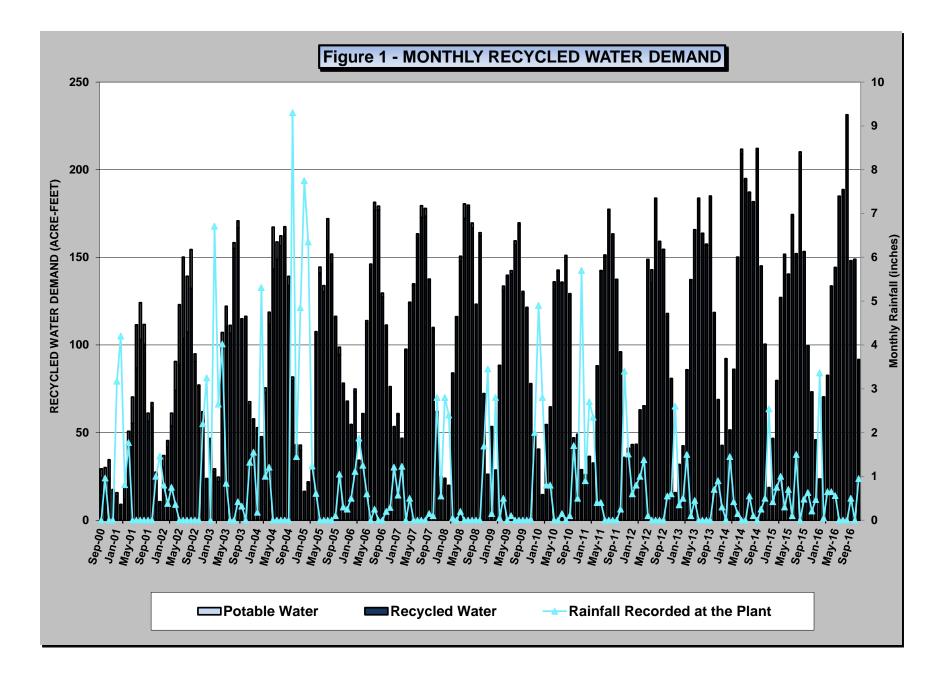

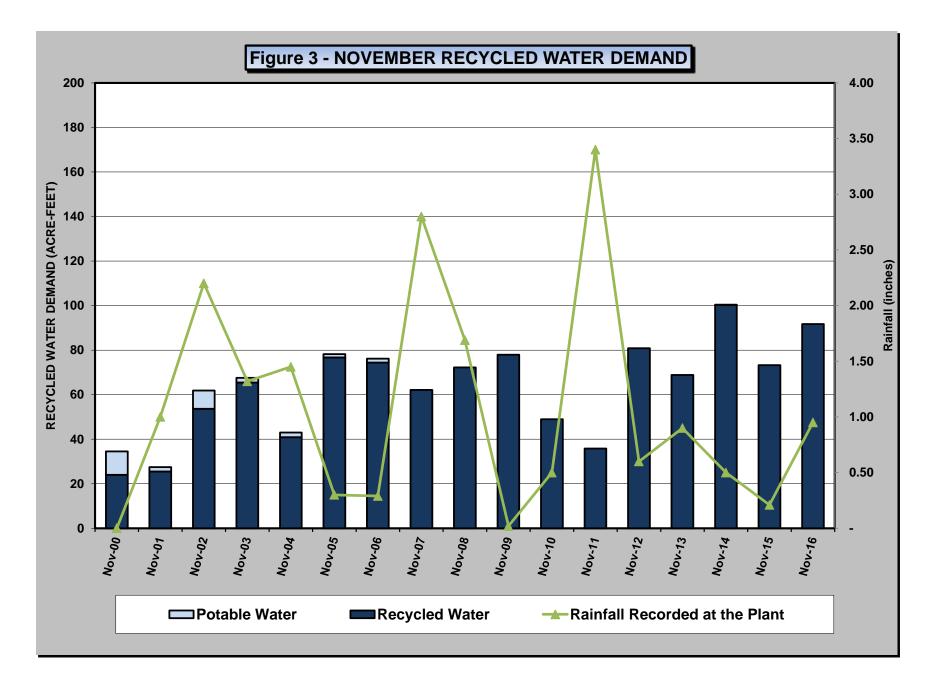

SUBJECT: CAPITAL PROGRAM FINANCING UPDATE

#### RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Board of Directors:

1. Discuss and take action as appropriate.

#### BACKGROUND

In 2015, the San Elijo Joint Powers Authority (SEJPA) completed a detailed facility inspection and evaluation (conducted by Carollo Engineers). The result of this effort was the 2015 Facility Plan for the San Elijo Water Reclamation Facility. This document was accepted and filed by the SEJPA Board at the April 2015 Board meeting, and provides the basis for planning and budgeting for future capital projects.

The 2015 Facility Plan recommended 17 capital projects, totaling \$37.9 million (2014 dollars). Staff reviewed the project priority list and selected 11 of these wastewater projects (totaling \$22.4 million) to be completed first, over a four-year period. In addition, staff identified approximately \$4.8 million in recycled water projects to be completed during this same period. Below in Table 1 are the wastewater projects.

In July 2015, the Board authorized the General Manager to request proposals from underwriters to pursue municipal bond financing of approximately \$22.4 million for wastewater projects and \$4.8 million for recycled water projects. Staff also investigated financing through the California State Revolving Fund (SRF), which provides loans at interest rates that are often lower than the municipal bond market. However, SRF loans require more documentation and generally take longer for approval. Staff has been pursuing two separate SRF loans (wastewater and recycled water) since September 2015. Recently, SRF staff informed the SEJPA that it does not have adequate funds for all of the applications received and that the program is over-prescribed. As a result, SRF staff informed the SEJPA that the recycled water loan has the greatest probability for funding.

SEJPA staff is continuing its pursuit of the SRF recycled water loan, and is now seeking municipal bond financing for wastewater related projects.

## DISCUSSION

In its pursuit for municipal bond financing for wastewater projects, the SEJPA is in discussion with Brandis Tallman LLC for underwriting services. Brandis Tallman is a full service investment banking firm that provides bond underwriting and placement agent services to public agencies. They have previously provided professional financial services to the SEJPA (\$11 million bond refunding and \$2 million recycled water loan) and to the City of Solana Beach (\$1.4 million bond refunding, \$480,000 utility, and \$570,000 sewer). Previous work performed by Brandis Tallman for the SEJPA was of good quality and exceeded financial expectations. The underwriting fee is being negotiated, and is expected to be consistent with prior bond transactions.

The bond financing will require additional professional services, financial document preparation, and resolution approvals by the Member Agencies' City Councils and the SEJPA's Board of Directors. The planned schedule is as follows:

#### January-February 2017

Document preparation that includes Board Resolutions authorizing the debt, a debt policy to comply with the new 2017 California Debt and Investment Advisory Commission (CDIAC) Local Debt Policy Requirements (SB1029), debt management policy, and a Preliminary Official Statement (POS) which provides information concerning the sale of the bonds including why the bonds are being issued, a description of the SEJPA, security for the bonds, and other relevant investor information. These documents will be distributed by bond disclosure counsel to the Member Agencies' Staff for comments.

#### March 2017

A second draft of the documents will be distributed based on the comments received. A credit package will be prepared for a rating call with Standard and Poor to substantiate or upgrade SEJPA's credit rating which is currently AA.

#### <u>April 2017</u>

Present final documents to the Member Agencies' City Councils for approval. Have a credit rating call with Standard and Poor; receive bond rating and request bond insurance quotes.

#### <u>May 2017</u>

Submit the final documents to the SEJPA Board for approval provided the Member Agencies' City Councils have approved. Follow up due diligence call regarding the POS, select bond insurer based on bids and finalize the POS for distribution to investors.

#### May-June 2017

Price and sell the bonds; close the transaction.

#### FINANCIAL IMPACT

There is no financial impact associated with the information in this staff report.

The SEJPA is pursuing a bond financing strategy that is consistent with the member agencies' current sewer rate schedule and that will not cause unplanned rate increases. The General Manager will update the Board as financial information is available.

## RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Board of Directors:

- 1. Authorize the General Manager to execute Caltrans Utility Agreement; and
- 2. Discuss and take action as appropriate.

#### BACKGROUND

The San Elijo Joint Powers Authority (SEJPA) owns and operates a recycled water utility that provides recycled water to the San Dieguito Water District, Olivenhain Municipal Water District, Santa Fe Irrigation District, and City of Del Mar. The system includes three offsite storage reservoirs and approximately 19 miles of distribution pipelines ranging from 4-inch to 24-inch in diameter and is an essential component of SEJPA's infrastructure. (SEJPA can only discharge treated wastewater through the recycled water or ocean outfall systems). Some of the recycled water pipelines are located within the Caltrans right-of-way, and are now in conflict with proposed transportation improvements associated with the North Coast Corridor (NCC) Program.

The NCC Program is a 40-year, multi-phase project designed to provide transportation, environmental, and coastal access improvements. Construction of the first phase broke ground in December 2016 and is anticipated to continue through 2021. This phase is estimated to cost approximately \$700 million and will include construction of rail, freeway, and bike path improvements, as well as San Elijo lagoon restoration.

#### DISCUSSION

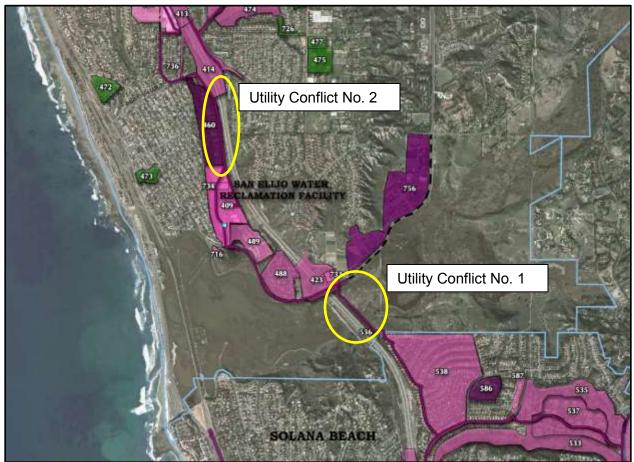


Figure 1 – SEJPA Recycled Water Distribution System

SEJPA has been working collaboratively with Caltrans to identify and resolve utility conflicts with the NCC program. During this process, two sections of SEJPA recycled water pipelines have been identified for relocation. Figure 1 illustrates the general area of the two utility conflicts. The

proposed relocation will remain in the vicinity of the existing pipeline, which will help minimize the relocation cost.

The design of the first segment (Utility Conflict No.1), which is approximately 1,010 linear feet of 12-inch diameter pipe, has been completed. The estimated cost for relocating the pipeline is \$850,973, which Caltrans can perform on the SEJPA's behalf as part of the NCC project work. Both SEJPA and Caltrans agree that relocating the pipelines as part of the NCC project will provide advantages to both parties, including administration streamlining, permitting, construction scheduling, and economy of scale in pricing.

The attached Utility Agreement provides a legal agreement between Caltrans and SEJPA for the completion of the relocation work associated with Utility Conflict No. 1. Caltrans and SEJPA are of different opinions regarding which party is responsible for the relocation costs. As such, the agreement clarifies that liability for cost of the work is under dispute. Ultimately, this cost responsibility determination may require a court decision.

The second segment of pipeline in conflict (Utility Conflict No. 2) is currently in design. Upon completion of design, Caltrans and SEJPA will prepare a second Utility Agreement, which will be presented at a future Board meeting for approval consideration.

#### FINANCIAL IMPACT

The prospective financial impact to SEJPA for relocating approximately 1,010 linear feet of 12 inch diameter recycled water pipeline is \$850,973. The actual final relocation cost may be different than the estimated cost, based on actual time and material required for the construction. Caltrans will construct the utility relocation, and will seek reimbursement from the SEJPA. As noted above, the SEJPA has taken the position that the expense for relocating the recycled water pipeline is the responsibility of Caltrans, pursuant to Section 703 of the Streets and Highway Code. SEJPA has the option to agree with Caltrans and provide reimbursement upon project completion, or seek dispute resolution through negotiations with Caltrans, or a court action.

It is, therefore, recommended that the Board of Directors:

- 1. Authorize the General Manager to execute Caltrans Utility Agreement; and
- 2. Discuss and take action as appropriate.

Such Revised Notices to Owner, approved by the STATE and agreed to/acknowledged by the OWNER, will constitute an approved revision of the plan described above and are hereby made a part hereof. No work under said deviation shall commence prior to written execution by the OWNER of the Revised Notice to Owner. Changes in the scope of the work will require an amendment to this Agreement in addition to the Revised Notice to Owner. OWNER shall have the right to inspect the work during construction. Upon completion of the work by STATE, OWNER agrees to accept ownership and maintenance of the constructed facilities and relinquishes to STATE ownership of the replaced facilities.

#### II. LIABILITY OF WORK

Ordered work described as SEJPA relocation plans on Caltrans Utility Sheets from U-15 to U-19, dated May 23, 2016, is in dispute under Section 703 of the Streets & Highway Code. That in signing this Utility Agreement, neither STATE nor OWNER shall diminish their position nor waive any of their rights nor does either party accept liability for the disputed work. STATE and OWNER reserve the right to have liability resolved by future negotiations or by an action in court of competent jurisdiction.

#### III. PERFORMANCE OF WORK

OWNER shall have access to all phases of the relocation work to be performed by STATE, as described in Section I above, for the purpose of inspection to ensure that the work is in accordance with the specifications contained in the Highway Construction Contract; however, all questions regarding the work being performed will be directed to STATE's Resident Engineer for their evaluation and final disposition.

Use of out-of-state personnel, (or personnel requiring lodging and meal per diem expenses) will not be allowed without prior written authorization by State's representative. Requests for such authorization must be contained in OWNER's estimate of actual and necessary relocation costs. Accounting Form FA 1301 is to be completed and submitted for all non-State personnel travel per diem. OWNER shall include an explanation why local employee or contract labor is not considered adequate for the relocation work proposed. Per Diem expenses shall not exceed the per diem expense amounts allowed under the State's Department of Personnel Administration travel expense guidelines.

#### IV. PAYMENT FOR WORK

The STATE shall pay its share of the actual and necessary cost, if any, of the herein described work within 45 days after final liability determination and after receipt of OWNER's itemized bill signed by a responsible official of OWNER's organization and prepared on OWNER's letterhead, compiled on the basis of the actual and necessary cost and expense. The OWNER shall maintain records of the actual costs incurred and charged or allocated to the project in accordance with recognized accounting principles.

It is understood and agreed that the STATE will not pay for any betterment or increase in capacity of OWNER's facilities in the new location and that OWNER, after final liability determination, shall give credit to the STATE for the accrued depreciation of the replaced facilities and for the salvage value of any material or parts salvaged and retained or sold by OWNER.

After the final liability determination, and if it is determined that the STATE pays a portion or all of the actual and necessary costs, not more frequently than once a month, but at least quarterly, OWNER will prepare and submit itemized progress bills for costs incurred not to exceed OWNER's recorded costs as of the billing date less estimated credits applicable to completed work. Payment of progress bills not to exceed the amount of this Agreement may be made under the terms of this Agreement. Payment of progress bills which exceed the amount of this Agreement may be made after receipt and approval by STATE of documentation supporting the cost increase and after an Amendment to this Agreement has been executed by the parties to this Agreement.

After the final liability determination, and if it is determined that the STATE pays a portion or all of the actual and necessary costs, the OWNER shall submit a final bill to the STATE within 360 days after the completion of the work described in Section I above. If the STATE has not received a final bill within 360 days after notification of completion of Owner's work described in Section I of this Agreement, and STATE has delivered to OWNER fully executed Director's Deeds, Consents to Common Use or Joint Use Agreements, if required for OWNER's facilities, STATE will provide written notification to OWNER of its intent to close its file within 30 days and OWNER hereby acknowledges, to the extent allowed by law, that all remaining costs will be deemed to have been abandoned. If the STATE processes a final bill for payment more than 360 days after notification of COWNER's work, payment of the late bill may be subject to allocation and/or approval by the California Transportation Commission.

After the final liability determination, and if it is determined that the STATE pays a portion or all of the actual and necessary costs, the final billing shall be in the form of an itemized statement of the total costs charged to the project, less the credits provided for in this Agreement, and less any amounts covered by progress billings. However, the STATE shall not pay final bills which exceed the estimated cost of this Agreement without documentation of the reason for the increase of said cost from the OWNER and approval of documentation by STATE. Except, if the final bill exceeds the OWNER's estimated costs solely as the result of a revised Notice to Owner as provided for in Section I, a copy of said revised Notice to Owner shall suffice as documentation. In either case, payment of the amount over the estimated cost of this Agreement may be subject to allocation and/or approval by the California Transportation Commission.

In any event if the final bill exceeds 125% of the estimated cost of this Agreement, an Amended Agreement shall be executed by the parties to this Agreement prior to the payment of the OWNER's final bill. Any and all increases in costs that are the direct result of deviations from the work described in Section I of this Agreement, shall have the prior concurrence of STATE.

Detailed records from which the billing is compiled shall be retained by the OWNER for a period of three years from the date of the final payment and will be available for audit by State and/or Federal auditors. In performing work under this Agreement, owner agrees to comply with the Uniform System of Accounts for Public Utilities found at 18 CFR Part 101, 201, et al., and, to the extent they are applicable to owner doing work on the project that is the subject of this agreement, the contract cost principles and procedures as set forth in 48 CFR, Chapter 1, Part 31, et seq., 23 CFR, Chapter 1, Part 645, and 2 CFR Part 200 et al. to the extent they are applicable. If a subsequent STATE and/or

Federal audit determines payments to be unallowable, owner agrees to reimburse agency upon receipt of agency billing. If owner is subject to repayment due to failure by State to comply with applicable laws, regulations, and ordinances then State will ensure that owner is compensated for actual cost in performing work under this agreement.

#### V. GENERAL CONDITIONS

After final liability determination and it is determined that the OWNER is responsible for all costs accrued by OWNER as a result of STATE's request of **December 15, 2013** to review, study and/or prepare relocation plans and estimates for the project associated with this Agreement may be billed pursuant to the terms and conditions of this Agreement.

If STATE's project which precipitated this Agreement is canceled or modified so as to eliminate the necessity of work by OWNER, STATE will notify OWNER in writing and STATE reserves the right to terminate this Agreement by Amendment. The Amendment shall provide mutually acceptable terms and conditions for terminating the Agreement.

All obligations of STATE under the terms of this Agreement are subject to the passage of the annual Budget Act by the State Legislature and the allocation of those funds by the California Transportation Commission.

STATE shall submit a Notice of Completion to the OWNER within 30 days of the completion and acceptance by the STATE of the work described herein.

The STATE estimated amount of this relocation work described in Section I is **\$855,973.00**.

It is understood that said highway is a Federal aid highway and accordingly, 23 CFR, Chapter 1, Part 645 is hereby incorporated into this Agreement. The STATE'S Contractor shall abide to Section 5-1.47 in the 2015 Standard Specification section regarding "Guarantee" and Section 5-1.38 regarding "Maintenance and Protection Relief" for a minimum of one (1) year after completion and acceptance of OWNER'S waterline.

OWNER understands and acknowledges that this project is subject to the requirements of the Buy America law (23 U.S.C., Section 313) and applicable regulations, including 23 CFR 635.410 and FHWA guidance. OWNER hereby certifies that in the performance of this Agreement, for products where Buy America requirements apply, it shall use only such products for which it has received a certification from its supplier, or provider of construction services that procures the product certifying Buy America compliance. This does not include products for which waivers have been granted under 23 CFR 635.410 or other applicable provisions or excluded material cited in the Department's guidelines for the implementation of Buy America requirements for utility relocations issued on December 3, 2013."

In addition, the provisions of 23 CFR 635.410, Buy America, are also incorporated into this agreement. The Buy America requirements are further specified in Moving Ahead for Progress in the 21st Century (MAP-21), section 1518; 23 CFR 635.410 requires that all manufacturing processes have occurred in the United States for steel and iron products (including the application of coatings) installed on a project receiving funding from the FHWA.

Provided STATE's contractor performs all or part of the work hereunder, the parties acknowledge and agree that STATE's contractor shall be solely responsible for satisfying any and all requirements relative to the Buy America Rule concerning the materials thus provided (including, but not limited to, ensuring and certifying that said materials comply with the requirements of the Buy America Rule)."
