15. <u>WATER CAMPUS IMPROVEMENT PROJECT – STAGE 2 LEASE-PURCHASE</u> <u>AGREEMENT UPDATE</u>

General Manager Thornton reported that in March 2020, after the Board provided authorization to execute the Lease-Purchase Agreement Amendment with PCL

Construction, staff paused contract preparation to evaluate potential risk that the COVID-19 pandemic could present to the project.

Staff, along with input from PCL and Legal Counsel, put together a new two-phased approach to the project. The new two-phased approach integrates COVID-19 language into construction documents, requires contractor COVID-19 preventative measures, construction of weather-dependent work during dry season, and rebidding approximately 75% of the project bid packages.

General Manager Thornton stated that there are no anticipated additional costs associated with the staff's recommendation and that the budget remains unchanged at \$18,410,000. While there are no anticipated cost increases, there is potential for cost savings with bidding in current market conditions.

16. <u>PRESENTATION OF THE SAN ELIJO JOINT POWERS AUTHORITY FISCAL YEAR</u> 2020-21 RECOMMENDED BUDGET

Amy Chang, Director of Finance and Administration, presented SEJPA's FY 2020-21 Recommended Budget. Programs budgeted by the SEJPA include: Wastewater Treatment, Laboratory Services, Ocean Outfall, Pump Stations, Stormwater Services, Generator Services, and Recycled Water.

The Recommended FY 2020-21 Budget consists of \$7,706,394 operating costs, \$2,460,973 debt service, and \$1,730,000 capital projects for a total budget of \$11,897,367.

Mrs. Chang informed the Board of Directors that the proposed operating budget for all programs will increase by \$765,039. The Recycled Water program represents the largest increase of \$332,270 and includes funding for planning and engineering for storage and conveyance improvements, potable reuse regional study, and \$100,000 for retrofit loans. The loan program, which has been used successfully in previous budgets, will provide financial assistance to new recycled water customers in retrofitting their irrigations systems to accept recycled water. Staff has found that the cost of conversion is the main reason why customers do not convert to recycled water. The Ocean Outfall program is

recommended to increase \$171,243 due to supplies, testing, and personnel costs required to comply with new requirements by the Regional Water Quality Control Board to complete a plume tracking study. The Laboratory program is recommended to increase \$123,852 due to supplies, testing, and personnel costs required to comply with new requirements by the Environmental Laboratory Accreditation Program (ELAP). The Wastewater Treatment program is proposed to increase \$92,883 primarily as a result of cost increases for biosolids hauling, operational IT support and software licensing, odor control chemicals, and insurance premiums. Operational cost increases to other programs totaled \$44,791.

For SEJPA Member Agencies, the total proposed budget increase for FY 2020-21, including operations, capital, and debt services, is 2.41% for the City of Encinitas and 3.54% for the City of Solana Beach. These program costs have been discussed with agencies served by SEJPA and staff has received guidance that they are within their budget expectations.





DISCUSSION

Monthly Treatment Plant Performance and Evaluation


Figure 1 (attached) provides monthly demands for recycled water since deliveries began in September 2000. Figure 2 (attached) provides a graphical view of annual recycled water demand spanning the last 19 fiscal years. Figure 3 (attached) shows the monthly recycled water demand for each March since the program began. Figure 4 (attached) compares budget versus actual recycled water sales for FY 2019-20.

Wastewater treatment for the San Elijo Joint Powers Authority (SEJPA) met all National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) ocean effluent limitation requirements for the month of April 2020. The primary indicators of treatment performance include the removal of Carbonaceous Biochemical Oxygen Demand (CBOD) and Total Suspended Solids (TSS). The SEJPA is required to remove a minimum of 85 percent of the CBOD and TSS from the wastewater. Treatment levels for CBOD and TSS were 96.7 and 98.2 percent removal, respectively (as shown in Figure 1 and Figure 2).





Member Agency Flows

Presented below are the influent and effluent flows for the month of April. Average daily influent flows were recorded for each Member Agency. Total effluent flow was calculated for the San Elijo Water Reclamation Facility.









It is recommended that the Board of Directors:

- 1. Authorize the General Manager to exercise the first optional 1-year service extension with California Water Technologies, LLC for the procurement of Ferric Chloride for an amount not to exceed \$78,000; and
- 2. Discuss and take action as appropriate.

BACKGROUND

San Elijo Joint Powers Authority (SEJPA) and Encina Wastewater Authority (EWA) operate similar facilities in north coastal San Diego County. Over the last several years, the agencies have partnered to identify opportunities to share resources, collaborate on mutual aid, and create efficiencies to reduce costs and improve service.

Success has been obtained in shared Human Resources services, work safety collaboration, and emergency response assistance. EWA and SEJPA have also implemented a labor leasing agreement that allows employee sharing between the agencies to address spikes in workloads and fluctuation in staffing, conduct special projects, or other assignments.

In 2016, 2018, and 2019, EWA and SEJPA were successful in partnering on opportunities to reduce cost through bulk purchasing of supplies and services. Staff identified two chemicals (Sodium Hypochlorite and Ferric Chloride) that are common to the operation of both agencies and that are purchased in large quantities, usually through multi-year contracts.

Staff worked with Procopio Cory Hargreaves & Savitch LLP to develop joint agency agreements for bulk purchasing of supplies and services. The agreements address purchasing terms and responsibilities of each agency, as well as liability, indemnification, and insurance requirements to reduce risk to all parties. EWA and SEJPA have found that jointly requesting bids and issuing separate supply contracts is an efficient method of procurement and contract administration.

DISCUSSION

EWA staff solicited bids for Ferric Chloride on May 7, 2019 and opened the bids on June 10, 2019. The initial 1-year contract was awarded to the low bidder, California Water Technologies (CWT) at the July 8, 2019 Board meeting. The initial contract expires June 30, 2020 and CWT has offered to extend the contract for another year at the same pricing terms of \$630 per dry ton.

The original bid documents outlined a 1-year term with two optional 1-year extensions. CWT successfully completed the first year of the agreement and SEJPA staff recommends extending the term of the agreement for another year at the same terms.

FISCAL IMPACT

Funding for the proposed Ferric Chloride chemical purchase is budgeted at \$78,000 in SEJPA's proposed Budget for FY 2020-21.

It is therefore recommended that the Board of Directors:

- 3. Authorize the General Manager to exercise the first optional 1-year service extension with California Water Technologies, LLC for the procurement of Ferric Chloride for an amount not to exceed \$78,000;
- 4. Discuss and take action as appropriate.

AMENDMENT 1 TO AGREEMENT

This **AMENDMENT 1** is made and entered into on this 8th day of June, 2020, by and between the San Elijo Joint Powers Authority, hereinafter referred to as "AUTHORITY", and California Water Technologies, LLC, a Michigan limited liability company, hereinafter referred to as SUPPLIER.

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, on July 8, 2019, AUTHORITY entered into an Agreement with SUPPLIER for such services in the amount of \$78,000; and

WHEREAS, the AUTHORITY desires and the SUPPLIER is willing extend the term of the AGREEMENT for one additional year for the provision of Ferric Chloride at the same price per unit.

WHEREAS, the AUTHORITY and SUPPLIER agree that the additional services related to this AMENDMENT 1 shall not exceed \$78,000 unless otherwise agreed to by both parties in writing.

NOW THEREFORE, the AUTHORITY and SUPPLIER agree to amend Section 1 and the first paragraph of Section 3 of the AGREEMENT as follows:

- 1. <u>TERM.</u> The term of this Agreement shall be from the date this Agreement is made and entered, as first written above, until June 30, 2021, with the option of one (1) additional one (1) year terms at the request of AUTHORITY.
- 3. <u>AUTHORITY'S OBLIGATIONS</u>. For furnishing services or supplies as specified in the Agreement, AUTHORITY will pay, and SUPPLIER shall receive compensation for Ferric Chloride at the unit price of \$630 per dry ton. The total amount of Ferric Chloride to be purchased under this Agreement has been estimated to be 123.8 dry tons per year, but actual usage may be considerably less. In no case will total compensation exceed \$156,000. The unit cost and total cost shall include all delivery, tax and shipping charges.

All other provisions of the AGREEMENT shall remain unchanged.

BACKGROUND

San Elijo Joint Powers Authority (SEJPA) and Encina Wastewater Authority (EWA) operate water pollution control facilities and water reclamation facilities in north coastal San Diego County. Over the last several years, the agencies have partnered to identify opportunities to share resources, collaborate on mutual aid, and create efficiencies to reduce costs and improve service.

In 2016, EWA and SEJPA examined opportunities to reduce cost through bulk purchasing of supplies and services. Staff identified two chemicals (Sodium Hypochlorite and Ferric Chloride) that are common to the operation of both agencies and that are purchased in large quantities, usually through multi-year agreement.

DISCUSSION

In May 2018, SEJPA and EWA staff prepared a bid solicitation for Sodium Hypochlorite, and Olin Corporation submitted the low bid proposal with a unit cost of \$0.744 per gallon. On June 11, 2018, the SEJPA Board authorized the General Manager to enter into agreement with Olin Corporation to supply sodium hypochlorite at a unit price of \$0.744 per gallon and for an amount not to exceed \$62,000. This agreement has the option for two one-year extensions upon mutual agreement by all parties.

On May 20, 2019, SEJPA requested to extend the term of the agreement for an additional year at the same unit price of \$0.744 per gallon, and Olin accepted the request.

On February 25, 2020 SEJPA contacted Olin to extend the term of the agreement for the second additional year and Olin requested a 5% increase in the price per gallon to \$0.781 per gallon. Staff engaged Olin to negotiate a lower increase, however Olin was willing to let the agreement expire if their offer was not accepted. It is staff's opinion that accepting Olin's offer of \$0.781 per gallon is in the best interest of the agency as the next bid received in 2018 was \$0.88 per gallon.

The main use of sodium hypochlorite is for disinfection of recycled water and so the use varies with the recycled water demand and may vary depending upon weather. Staff anticipates similar chemical use for FY 2020-21, with projected usage in the range of \$70,000 to \$80,000. Staff recommends an agreement limit of \$80,000 for FY 2020-21.

FISCAL IMPACT

The FY 2020-21 Recommended Budget includes \$80,000 for sodium hypochlorite, which provides allowance for variance in volume use. The proposed agreement extension is for a recommended amount not to exceed \$80,000. If chemical use beyond this agreement value is required, staff will return the item for Board consideration.

It is therefore recommended that the Board of Directors:

- 3. Authorize the General Manager to exercise the second optional 1-year service extension with Olin Corporation for the procurement of Sodium Hypochlorite for an amount not to exceed \$80,000; and
- 4. Discuss and take action as appropriate.

AMENDMENT 2 TO AGREEMENT

This **AMENDMENT 2** is made and entered into on this 8th day of June, 2020, by and between the San Elijo Joint Powers Authority, a joint powers authority organized and operating pursuant to Government Code Sections 6500 et seq., hereinafter referred to as "AUTHORITY", and Olin Corporation, dba Olin Chlor Alkali Products and Vinyl, hereinafter referred to as "SUPPLIER".

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, Encina Wastewater Authority (EWA) and AUTHORITY jointly invited bids for the provision of Sodium Hypochlorite;

WHEREAS, on July 1, 2018, AUTHORITY entered into an Agreement with SUPPLIER for such services in the amount of \$62,000; and

WHEREAS, on May 20, 2019, AUTHORITY entered into an Amended Agreement with SUPPLIER for such services in the amount of \$82,000; and

WHEREAS, the AUTHORITY desires and SUPPLIER is willing extend the term of the AGREEMENT for one additional year for the provision of Sodium Hypochlorite at the same price per unit.

WHEREAS, the AUTHORITY and SUPPLIER agree that the additional services related to this AMENDMENT 2 shall not exceed \$80,000 unless otherwise agreed to by both parties in writing.

NOW THEREFORE, the AUTHORITY and SUPPLIER agree to amend Section 1 and the first paragraph of Section 3 of the AGREEMENT as follows:

- 1. <u>TERM</u>. The term of this Agreement shall be from the date this Agreement is made and entered, as first written above, until June 30, 2021, with the option of one (1) additional year term at the request of AUTHORITY.
- 2. <u>AUTHORITY'S OBLIGATIONS</u>. The total amount of Sodium Hydroxide to be purchased under this Agreement has been estimated to be 102,000 gallons per year, but actual usage may be considerably less. In no case will total compensation exceed \$224,000. The unit cost and total cost shall include all delivery, tax, and shipping charges.

All other provisions of the AGREEMENT shall remain unchanged.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Board of Directors:

- 1. Authorize the General Manager to exercise the second optional 1-year service extension with Thatcher Company of California, Inc. for the procurement of Aluminum Sulfate for an amount not to exceed \$16,200; and
- 2. Authorize the General Manager to exercise the second optional 1-year service extension with Thatcher Company of California, Inc. for the procurement of Citric Acid for an amount not to exceed \$20,600; and
- 3. Discuss and take action as appropriate.

BACKGROUND

Each year the San Elijo Joint Powers Authority solicits bids for chemical purchases. Aluminum Sulfate is used as a coagulant to enhance filtration in the sand filters used to produce recycled water. Citric Acid is used to clean scaling from the microfiltration process, also in the production of recycled water. Bid packages were prepared in 2018 for procurement of both of these chemicals for a 1-year term with two 1-year extension options and Thatcher Company of California was the low bidder in each package. A contract for each chemical was executed on July 1, 2018 at the low bid price of \$540 per liquid ton for Aluminum Sulfate and \$7.49 per gallon for Citric Acid. On May 1, 2019 a contract extension was issued for both contracts to extend the term at the same pricing for an additional year through June 30, 2020.

DISCUSSION

Thatcher Company of California has offered to extend the term of both agreements for the final 1-year optional term at the same pricing that was originally offered in 2018. This would be the final contract extension through June 30, 2021 and keeps the cost of Aluminum Sulfate and Citric Acid constant for a third straight year.

FISCAL IMPACT

The FY 2020-21 Recommended Budget includes \$63,000 for miscellaneous chemicals, which provides allowance for variance in volume use and chemical types. The proposed agreement extension is for a recommended amount not to exceed \$16,200 for Aluminum Sulfate and \$20,600 for Citric Acid, which is well within the budget allowance.

It is therefore recommended that the Board of Directors:

- 1. Authorize the General Manager to exercise the second optional 1-year service extension with Thatcher Company of California, Inc. for the procurement of Aluminum Sulfate for an amount not to exceed \$16,200; and
- 2. Authorize the General Manager to exercise the second optional 1-year service extension with Thatcher Company of California, Inc. for the procurement of Citric Acid for an amount not to exceed \$20,600; and
- 3. Discuss and take action as appropriate.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Board of Directors:

- 1. Adopt Resolution No. 2020-05, Resolution Approving the San Elijo Joint Powers Authority Operating and Capital Improvement Budgets for Fiscal Year 2020-21;
- 2. Adopt Resolution No. 2020-06, Resolution Approving the San Elijo Joint Powers Authority Investment Policy and Guidelines and Appointment of Amy Chang as SEJPA Treasurer;
- 3. Authorize SEJPA Treasurer to deposit any surplus FY 2019-20 budgeted funds not expended or otherwise encumbered by June 30, 2020 into the SEJPA PARS Public Agencies Post-Employment Benefits Trust Program; and
- 4. Discuss and take action as appropriate.

DISCUSSION

The Fiscal Year (FY) 2020-21 Recommended Budget (Budget) was presented publicly to the Board of Directors at the May 2020 Board meetings for discussion, comments, and direction. Staff has presented the budget to staff of both Member Agencies, and the other participating government agencies served by SEJPA for comments. In addition, the Budget was posted on SEJPA's website for public access. No comments or requested changes have been received; therefore, the Budget is being presented to the Board of Directors for adoption under Resolution No. 2020-05.

The Budget is anticipated to be adequate to fulfill the mission of SEJPA, and is consistent with the sewer rate structures of both Member Agencies. The total recommended operating budget for FY 2020-21 is \$7,706,394, and is presented below in Table 1:

The recommended FY 2020-21 Capital Program request is \$1,730,000, which is comprised of the following:

- Wastewater Treatment \$1,070,000
- Ocean Outfall \$185,000
- Cardiff Pump Station \$170,000
- Solana Beach Pump Station \$25,000
- Recycled Water \$280,000

Debt Service for FY 2020-21 is \$2,514,361; and includes \$1,516,533 for Wastewater and \$997,828 for Recycled Water.

SEJPA management has carefully reviewed the proposed budget including debt financing to control costs without impacting the agency's ability to perform its vital functions. The proposed operating budget for all programs will increase by \$765,039, which includes expanded services to the City of Del Mar, and additional resources to increase recycled water and stormwater reuse. The proposed Budget is in line with the Member Agencies FY 2020-21 expectations. The Recycled Water Program represents the largest increase of \$332,270 or 21.6%. This increase includes an analysis of storage and conveyance improvements, a potable reuse regional study, and a \$100,000 retrofit loan program to provide financial assistance to new customers for costs associated with converting from potable water to recycled water. The Wastewater Treatment Program is proposed to increase \$92,883 or 3.1% primarily as a result of increases with biosolids hauling, IT support and software licensing, and insurance premiums. The Laboratory program is recommended to increase \$123,852 or 21.9% due to additional supplies, testing, and personnel required to comply with new Environmental Laboratory Accreditation Program (ELAP). An additional position in Laboratory Program was approved by the Board in December 2019. The Ocean Outfall Program is recommended to increase by \$171,243 or 20.5% for a plume tracking study to comply with new National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit regulations. All other programs are budgeted to increase \$44,791 or 4.5%.

The recommended FY 2020-21 Budget is now ready for Board consideration for adoption as presented in the attached Resolution No. 2020-05.

Investment Policy

State law requires that the Investment Policy be reviewed and adopted annually. No changes are recommended to SEJPA's investment policy at this time. SEJPA's investment policy allows for investment in the State Local Agency Investment Fund (LAIF) and in the San Diego County Investment Pool. These two tools have been the basis of all investment activity since SEJPA became independent from the County of San Diego.

In addition, State law requires that a SEJPA Treasurer be appointed annually. The current SEJPA Treasurer is Amy Chang, Director of Finance/Administration. The General Manager recommends reappointing Amy Chang as SEJPA's Treasurer.

Public Agencies Post-Employment Benefits Trust Funding

On August 20, 2018, the Board adopted the PARS Public Agencies Post-Employment Benefits Trust (Trust) program for the purpose of pre-funding pension obligations and/or OPEB obligations, and appointed the General Manager or his successor or designee as the Plan Administrator for the PARS program. This program is an irrevocable, locally controlled trust that is dedicated to either pension expense or OPEB expense. It provides investment flexibility (conservative to aggressive), control over the contribution from the Trust to CalPERS Unfunded Actuarial Liability (UAL), and easier monitoring of investment performance.

Funding an irrevocable trust will provide restricted funds that may be used at the Board's discretion to smooth pension expense that can fluctuate due to changes in investment market conditions and CaIPERS policies, in addition to making additional contributions to reduce the UAL or pre-fund the OPEB liability in the future. The Trust's investments will be invested pursuant to a Board investment policy rather than CaIPERS investment policy.

As SEJPA nears the completion of FY 2019-20, Staff anticipates finishing the year more than \$300,000 under budget. Staff recommends applying unspent operational funds to PARS. Funding PARS will increase the current irrevocable trust balance that may be used at the Board's discretion to reduce the UAL or CalPERS pension expense to manage annual cash demands.

It is therefore recommended that the Board of Directors:

- 1. Adopt Resolution No. 2020-05, Resolution Approving the San Elijo Joint Powers Authority Operating and Capital Improvement Budgets for Fiscal Year 2020-21;
- 2. Adopt Resolution No. 2020-06, Resolution Approving the San Elijo Joint Powers Authority Investment Policy and Guidelines and Appointment of Amy Chang as SEJPA Treasurer;
- 3. Authorize SEJPA Treasurer to deposit any surplus FY 2019-20 budgeted funds not expended or otherwise encumbered by June 30, 2020 into the SEJPA PARS Public Agencies Post-Employment Benefits Trust Program; and

EXHIBIT A TO RESOLUTION NO. 2020-06

SAN ELIJO JOINT POWERS AUTHORITY INVESTMENT POLICY AND GUIDELINES AND APPOINTMENT OF SEJPA TREASURER

1. <u>PURPOSE</u>

This Statement is intended to provide guidelines for the prudent investment of the San Elijo Joint Powers Authority's (SEJPA) temporary idle cash, and outline the policies for maximizing the efficiency of SEJPA's cash management system. The investment goal is to enhance the economic condition of SEJPA while insuring the safety of funds invested.

2. <u>OBJECTIVE</u>

SEJPA's cash management system is designed to accurately monitor and forecast expenditures and revenues, thus enabling SEJPA to invest funds to the fullest extent possible. SEJPA attempts to obtain the highest yield on its investments consistent with the criteria established for safety and liquidity.

3. POLICY

SEJPA's Treasurer is responsible for investing the surplus funds in SEJPA Treasury in accordance with the California Government Code, Sections 53600 et seq. and 53635 eq seq. SEJPA makes investments in accordance with California Government Code 53600.3, which states "all governing bodies of local agencies or persons authorized to make investment decisions on behalf of those local agencies investing public funds pursuant to this chapter are trustees and therefore fiduciaries subject to the prudent investor standard. When investing, reinvesting, purchasing, acquiring, exchanging, selling, or managing public funds, a trustee shall act with care, skill, prudence, and diligence under the circumstances then prevailing, including, but not limited to, the general economic conditions and the anticipated needs of the agency, that a prudent person acting in a like capacity and familiarity with those matters would use in the conduct of funds of a like character and with like aims, to safeguard the principal and maintain the liquidity needs of the agency. Within the limitations of this section and considering individual investments as part of an overall strategy, investments may be acquired as authorized by law."

The three principal factors of safety, liquidity and yield are to be taken into consideration when making investment decisions.

- A) <u>Safety</u>. Safety and the minimizing of risk associated with investing refer to attempts to reduce the potential for loss of principal, interest or a combination of the two. SEJPA invests only in those instruments that are considered very safe.
- B) <u>Liquidity</u>. Liquidity refers to the ability to convert an investment to cash promptly with a minimum risk of losing some portion of principal or interest. A portion of the portfolio should be maintained in liquid short-term securities which can be converted to cash, if necessary, to meet disbursement requirements.
- C) <u>Yield</u>. Yield is the average annual return on an investment based on the interest rate, price,

and length of time to maturity. SEJPA attempts to obtain the highest yield possible, provided that the basic criteria of safety and liquidity have been met.

4. INVESTMENT INSTRUMENTS

SEJPA may invest in the following instruments under the guidelines as provided herein:

- A) <u>Local Agency Investment Fund (LAIF)</u>. Investment of funds in the California LAIF which allows the State Treasurer to invest through the Pooled Money Investment Account. Maximum investment is subject to state regulation.
- B) <u>County of San Diego County Treasury</u>. Investment of funds in the Treasury of the County of San Diego that allows the County Treasurer to invest through the Pooled Money Investment Account.

5. <u>SAFEKEEPING</u>

All investments of SEJPA shall have the San Elijo Joint Powers Authority as registered owner or shall be kept in the custody of SEJPA or by a qualified safekeeping institution.

6. INVESTMENT REPORTS

- A) SEJPA's Treasurer shall submit a monthly investment report to SEJPA's General Manager Board of Directors containing the following information:
 - Financial institution
 - Type of investment
 - Amount of deposit
 - Rate of interest
- B) SEJPA's Treasurer shall annually render a Statement of Investment Policy to the Board of Directors.

7. INVESTMENT OF BOND FUNDS

In accordance with Government Code Section 53601, moneys held by a trustee or fiscal agent and pledged to the payment or security of bonds, may be invested in accordance with the statutory provisions governing the issuance of those bonds, ordinance, resolution, or indenture of trust.

- SUBJECT: PROPOSITION 1, INTEGRATED REGIONAL WATER MANAGEMENT, GRANT UPDATE

RECOMMENDATION

No action required. This memorandum is submitted for information only.

BACKGROUND

Integrated Regional Water Management (IRWM) is aimed at developing long-term water supply reliability, improving water quality, and protecting natural resources in California. The Statewide IRWM Program is supported by bond funding provided by the California Department of Water Resources (DWR) to fund competitive grants for projects that improve water resource management.

California IRWM grant funding was originally derived from Proposition 50, the Water Security, Clean Drinking Water, Coastal and Beach Protection Act of 2002. Since then, California voters approved Proposition 84 (The Safe Drinking Water, Water Quality and Supply, Flood Control, River and Coastal Protection Bond Act) in 2006 and then Proposition 1 (Water Quality, Supply, and Infrastructure Improvement Act) in 2014, both of which provide funding for IRWM grants.

The IRWM planning process is a local water management approach embraced by the Governor, DWR, and the State Water Resources Control Board. It is aimed at securing long-term water supply reliability within California by first recognizing the inter-connectivity of water supplies and the environment, then pursuing projects yielding multiple benefits for water supply, water quality, and natural resources.

DISCUSSION

SEJPA has a history of participating in the San Diego IRWM grant process and has secured grant funding for previous projects as both the lead and partnering agency, receiving approximately \$2.2 million for the SEJPA and \$8.5 million for north San Diego county cities and agencies. Past grant successes for the SEJPA include the construction of recycled water distribution pipelines,

storage improvements, and advanced water treatment, as part of building an integrated regional recycled water system. SEJPA supplies recycled water to four water purveyors (San Dieguito Water District, Santa Fe Irrigation District, Olivenhain Municipal Water District (OMWD), and the City of Del Mar) and has a direct retail agreement with the Encinitas Ranch Golf Authority.

In 2019, SEJPA applied for two IRWM grants under Proposition 1, and recently received confirmation of award. The first grant is for regional recycled water system improvements in north coastal San Diego county. SEJPA is the lead agency for this grant, with the City of Oceanside and OMWD as project partners. The grant value is \$2.82 million, with roughly \$370,000 allotted to SEJPA's component focused on expanding recycled water storage. Increasing recycled water storage has multiple benefits including greater service reliability, improved customer water pressure, allowance to store recycled stormwater, and as pressure relief to the outfall system during heavy storm events.

The second grant is for stormwater capture and reuse at the San Elijo Water Campus. SEJPA is the lead agency for this grant with the Nature Collective as a project partner. The grant value is \$1.195 million, of which SEJPA will receive just over \$1.1 million.

SEJPA is interested in capturing and reusing stormwater flows, as these waters are often a major source of pollution for streams, lagoons, and the ocean. Our intent is to develop a phased project that will first focus on capturing surface stormwater flows for treatment, storage within existing tankage, then reuse. The watershed that drains into this regional storm channel is 0.76 square miles within the community of Cardiff by the Sea (Figure 1). Phase 2 is intended to advance Phase 1 and create additional local supply through the construction of stormwater infiltration ponds on SEJPA property for groundwater recharge and wells to extract stored groundwater for reuse.

The Regional Water Boards are actively involved in initiatives to improve the management of stormwater as a resource and the recently awarded SEJPA grant will provide important funding to implement the needed infrastructure to capture and reuse this resource, while protecting downstream waterways from pollution.




Figure 2 – Stormwater Capture & Reuse Site Map

The proposed Stormwater Capture and Reuse project (Figure 2) couples existing stormwater, wastewater, and recycled water infrastructure with new proposed infrastructure to capture and divert local stormwater for treatment and reuse.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

There is no financial impact associated with this staff report, nor financial commitment by SEJPA to accept the proposed grant award. The grant agreement will be presented to the Board of Directors for acceptance consideration at a future Board meeting.

The May 2020 DWR recommended funding list for the San Diego region (Figure 3) identifies two SEJPA-led projects for a total of \$4,015,000. Of this amount, the approximate grant distribution is \$1,485,000 for SEJPA projects, \$1,700,000 for the City of Oceanside, \$750,000 for the Olivenhain Municipal Water District, and \$80,000 for the Nature Collective.
